


Age-Friendly Insights: **Direct Care Workers**

An overwhelming majority of people believe direct care workers need support now.


Direct care workers provide hands-on care with daily tasks like bathing and dressing in peoples' homes and in long-term care facilities, including nursing homes.

- Advocating for the Direct Care Workforce
 PHI advocates for high-quality training, a living wage and greater awareness of the important role direct care workers play.
- Advancing Training and Leadership Skills
 The <u>Teaching Nursing Home</u> model pairs academic nursing schools with long-term care facilities to improve training and education for staff, including direct care workers, providing them opportunities to foster and grow their careers and leadership skills.
- Redesigning Nursing Home Care
 The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine's <u>Committee on the Quality of Care in Nursing Homes'</u> is preparing recommendations for improving the quality of care in today's nursing homes, partly by investing in a highly-skilled direct care workforce.
